



Catholic Social Teaching in Health & Social Care



Human Dignity Care Values: Treating all service users with respect and autonomy, regardless of their needs, and ensuring patients' rights to make decisions about their care.



Solidarity

Preventing discrimination: providing care and support for marginalised and disadvantaged groups. Integrated Care Services support health inequalities, such as poverty, education, and housing.



Stewardship

Health and Wellbeing: Promoting public health initiatives that also consider environmental health.



Participation

Care provision Promoting patient advocacy supporting patient voice in health care policies and ensuring a patient's rights to make decisions about their care.



The Common Good

Care provision: Developing health policies that ensure equitable access to care for all members of society. Ensuring resources are allocated fairly so that vulnerable populations receive adequate care.



Job Roles: Upholding patients' rights to confidentiality, informed consent, and quality care.

Educating patients about their responsibilities regarding their own health and well-being.



Option for the Poor

Barriers to HSC: programmes specifically designed to assist those in poverty, including free or reduced-cost healthcare services and removing barriers to accessing HSC services.
