ATTENDANCE POLICY

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1. Aims

Our school aims to meet its obligations with regards to school attendance by:

- Promoting good attendance and reducing absence, including persistent absence
- Ensuring every pupil has access to full-time education to which they are entitled
- Acting early to address patterns of absence

We will also support parents to perform their legal duty to ensure their children of compulsory school age attend regularly, and will promote and support punctuality in attending lessons.

2. Legislation and guidance

3. School procedures

3.1 Attendance register

By law, all schools (except those where all pupils are boarders) are required to keep an attendance register, and all pupils must be placed on this register.

The attendance register will be taken at the start of the first session of each school day and once during the second session. It will mark whether every pupil is:

- Present
- Attending an approved off-site educational activity
- Absent
- Unable to attend due to exceptional circumstances

See appendix 1 for the DfE attendance codes.

Pupils must arrive in school by 09:00 on each school day.

The register for the first session will be taken at 09:00 and will be kept open until 09:20 (Monday and Tuesday) or 09:30 (Wednesday, Thursday and Friday).

3.2 Unplanned absence

Parents must notify the school on the first day of an unplanned absence – for example, if their child is unable to attend due to ill health – by 09:00 or as soon as practically possible (see also section 6).

Absence due to illness will be authorised unless the school has a genuine concern about the authenticity of the illness.

If the authenticity of the illness is in doubt, the school may ask parents to provide medical evidence, such as a doctor's note, prescription, appointment card or other appropriate form of evidence. We will not ask for medical evidence unnecessarily.

If the school is not satisfied about the authenticity of the illness, the absence will be recorded as unauthorised and will be subject for consideration under the Fixed Penalty Notice scheme.

3.3 Medical or dental appointments

Missing registration for a medical or dental appointment is counted as an authorised absence; advance notice is required for authorising these absences.

However, we encourage parents to make medical and dental appointments out of school hours where possible. Where this is not possible, the pupil should be out of school for the minimum amount of time necessary.

Parents should contact the school in advance to make them aware of any medical appointments.



Applications for other types of absence in term time must also be made in advance. Information relating to whether the school can authorise such absences can be found in section 4.

3.4 Lateness and punctuality

A pupil who arrives late but before the register has closed will be marked as late, using the appropriate code.

A pupil who arrives after the register has closed will be marked as absent, using the appropriate code.

3.5 Following up absence

The school will follow up any absences to ascertain the reason, ensure proper safeguarding action is taken where necessary, identify whether the absence is approved or not and identify the correct attendance code to use.

3.6 Reporting to parents

Where a pupil has not arrived in school and no reason has been given, the school will notify parents by a phone call or email home. This will be sent as early as possible in the day.

4. Authorised and unauthorised absence

4.1 Granting approval for term-time absence

Headteachers may not grant any leave of absence to pupils during term time unless they consider there to be 'exceptional circumstances'.

The school considers each application for term-time absence individually, taking into account the specific facts, circumstances and relevant context behind the request. A leave of absence is granted entirely at the headteacher's discretion.

Valid reasons for **authorised absence** include:

- Illness and medical/dental appointments – as explained in sections 3.2 and 3.3
- Religious observance – where one day is exclusively set apart for religious observance by the religious body to which the pupil's parents belong. If necessary, the school will seek advice from the parents' religious body to confirm whether the day is set apart. One day will be recorded as 'R' whilst the rest of the time will be granted at the school's discretion as Code C.
- Traveller pupils travelling for occupational purposes – this covers Roma, English and Welsh Gypsies, Irish and Scottish Travellers, Showmen (fairground people) and Circus people, Bargees (occupational boat dwellers) and New Travellers. Absence may be authorised only when a Traveller family is known to be travelling for occupational purposes and has agreed this with the school but it is not known whether the pupil is attending educational provision

4.2 Legal sanctions

Where the child is of compulsory school age, schools can make a referral to the Local Authority for consideration of a Fixed Penalty Notice (FPN) and/or Court action including the use of Education Supervision Orders (ESO). This is dependant on the number of unauthorised absences, it remains the Local Authority's decision on the type of intervention offered or used.

If a FPN is used, they are issued per parent, per child and are charged at £160 if paid within 28 days. In some cases, you may be offered the opportunity to pay a reduced amount of £80 if paid within 21 days.



This may take into account:

- A number of unauthorised absences occurring within a rolling academic year
- One-off instances of irregular attendance, such as holidays taken in term time without permission
- Where an excluded pupil is found in a public place during school hours without a justifiable reason

5. Strategies for promoting attendance

Good attendance is rewarded throughout the year in a number of ways, including with certificates and rewards trips for pupils.

Concerns about low attendance is monitored throughout the year, and contact will be made with parents where necessary.

6. Attendance monitoring

The attendance officer monitors pupil absence regularly, with contact home being made on a half termly basis when necessary.

Parents are expected to email the school in the morning if their child is going to be absent due to ill health (see section 3.2).

Parents are expected to email the school each morning their child is going to be absent.

If a pupil's absence goes below 95% we may contact the parents to discuss the reasons for this.

If after contacting parents a pupil's absence continue to rise, we will consider involving an education welfare officer.

The persistent absence threshold is 10%. If a pupil's individual overall absence rate is greater than or equal to 10%, the pupil will be classified as a persistent absentee.

Pupil-level absence data is collected each term and published at national and local authority level through the DfE's school absence national statistics releases. The underlying school-level absence data is published alongside the national statistics. We compare our attendance data to the national average, and share this with governors.

7. Roles and responsibilities

7.1 The governing board

The governing board is responsible for monitoring attendance figures for the whole school on at least a termly basis. It also holds the headteacher to account for the implementation of this policy.

7.2 The headteacher

The headteacher is responsible for ensuring this policy is implemented consistently across the school, and for monitoring school-level absence data and reporting it to governors.

The headteacher also supports other staff in monitoring the attendance of individual pupils and issues fixed-penalty notices, where necessary.

7.3 The attendance officer

The attendance officer:

- Monitors attendance data at the school and individual pupil level
- Reports concerns about attendance to the year leader / headteacher
- Works with education welfare officers to tackle persistent absence



- Liaises directly with the year leaders to arrange calls and meetings with parents to discuss attendance issues

7.4 Form tutors and class teachers

Form tutors and class teachers are responsible for recording attendance on a daily basis, using the correct codes, and submitting this information to the school office through Bromcom.

7.5 Reception staff

Reception staff are expected to take calls from parents about absence and record it on the school system.

8. Sixth form

8.1 Sixth form attendance

Sixth form students are expected to have above 95% attendance. We acknowledge that good school attendance plays an essential part in academic development for post 16 students. An exemplary record of attendance says a huge amount about the student as a person: that they are dedicated, well-motivated, organized and someone who takes their responsibilities seriously.

Sixth form students have a 7 period day but are authorised to leave the school site at 3.20pm if they do not have a period 7 lesson

8.2 Absences

Parents should report absences for sixth form students before 9am each day at absence@stwilfrids.com Section 3 of this policy applies to all students including sixth form.

8.3 Leaving the school site

Sixth form students have permission to leave the school site during break times. This is a privilege that may be revoked at any time should students not be following the procedures set. Students should ensure they sign in and out via reception using the Sign in App at all times.

Sixth form students are given an ID badge when they join and should have this on them at all times.

8.4 Study leave

Students may be given permission to work at home on days where they have no lessons, or in order to prepare them for exams. This will be marked as Study leave on Bromcom. Study leave can only be taken with prior permission from the relevant staff in school.

9. Monitoring arrangements

This policy will be reviewed yearly by the attendance officer and adapted as required.

10. Links with other policies

This policy is linked to our child protection and safeguarding policy.
