St Wilfrid's Spotlight Fundraising



Every year St Wilfrid's chooses a different cause for our fundraising focus. This year we have chosen Crawley Open House and The Mark Lay Foundation.

Crawley Open House

Crawley Open House is one of our house charities and one that we have we have worked in close partnership with in the past, to not only raise funds and provide resources, but also to raise awareness of the issue of homelessness. Crawley Open House provides support and services for those suffering the effects of homelessness, unemployment, loneliness, discrimination, or other forms of social exclusion. Their support is available to anyone in need.

Against this backdrop of an increase in the numbers of homeless, Crawley Open House continues to make a massive difference to the lives of some of society's most vulnerable people and works tirelessly to help get, and keep, "people off the streets".

Unfortunately, West Sussex County Council has announced that funding for centres like Crawley Open House are to be cut and as a result, Crawley Open House could lose approximately £250,000 per annum. This would have a devastating effect and would prevent the shelter from operating as it currently does.

This is the reason why St Wilfrid's chose Crawley Open House as one of our charities to raise money for this year.

The Mark Lay Foundation

The Mark Lay Foundation supports families who are affected by cancer by providing a financial grant to those who cannot afford to take a holiday or a short break. Their grant schemes provide eligible families financial support if they cannot afford to take a break from the gruelling day to day life of cancer and have not had the chance to create lasting memories together. The Mark Lay Foundation know first hand the importance of taking every moment possible to be together as a family, to make memories and to be able to cherish them when sadly the time comes to say goodbye. They aim to give this opportunity to other families who find themselves in this life shattering position by providing a grant that will go towards a holiday or short break. This term our students have embarked on many different forms of fundraising including Tutor Group Fundraising Fridays where we have seen each tutor group come up with a fundraising stall to raise money for their charity and these have included cakes sales, hot chocolate, sweets and a Christmas Film Night.

On Tuesday 18th December we held a Wear Something Purple/Christmas Jumper day where students had to pay £2 to take part and which raised over £1,500!

Our annual Christmas Raffle raised over £1,691 and we want to say a big thank you to The Kohli Family, The King Family, Tomaz Refurbishments, The Bagnall Family, The Kalkaprosand Family and for Mrs Sowter for sourcing our raffle prizes.

In total we have raised an amazing £7,800 !!! Thank you for all your help and support. This money really will help to change lives!

Sixth Form Sleep Out

On a very wet and windy evening on Tuesday 18th December 128 students and 11 staff from St Wilfrid's slept out in the courtyard raising £2,832 for our charities, Crawley Open House and The Mark Lay Foundation.



Each student had to raise a minimum of £25 to take part in the sleep out but this was a whole school fundraising incentive.

The evening began with our Christmas Liturgy, before all the Sixth Form students assembled in the Hall where Charlie Aratoon from Crawley Open House came along to give a talk to the students about homelessness and how they were helping with the money they raised.

At midnight, all the students and staff gathered in the courtyard for a candlelight reflection on their participation in the sleep out and to think about all those that were homeless. Everybody then bedded down for the night.

Mr Ferry commented, "I am in awe of the Sixth Form students who committed to our Sleep Out last night. All 128 of them chose to give up their evening to make a statement on the injustice of homelessness in the 21st century and to raise a phenomenal amount of money. In my opinion, the way you judge a civilised society is in the way it cares for its most vulnerable. It was quite poignant that on the day of our sleep out West Sussex County Council chose to ratify their planned cuts to funding for shelters such as Crawley Open House. The impact of this will be a loss of £250,000 per annum. Our students were a powerful voice last night proving that young people can make a huge difference. I am so proud to be their Headteacher."

Year 12 student Rory Nash commented, "It was brilliant to be part of such an amazing event. Waking up outside in the rain really put into perspective the hardships that some people face on a day to day basis, and shows us all just how lucky we are. The event alone was amazing and the fact we raised a significant amount of money for two very worthy causes makes it even better."

Mr Ferry spoke to each student, congratulating them personally with other members of the Leadership team also passing on their own congratulations. The Celebration Breakfast celebrates not just high academic or sporting achievements, but all those students who had excelled in their personal best in some way. That could be extra effort in school work, for outstanding attitude to learning, impeccable presentation, sporting achievement or any other form of hard work and self discipline that made them a good role model for their peers.



St Wilfrid's Presents Cats

Our school production for this academic year is CATS the award winning musical by Andrew Lloyd Webber. Cats is a sung-through musical composed by Andrew Lloyd Webber, based on Old Possum's Book of Practical Cats by T. S. Eliot. The musical tells the story of a tribe of cats called the Jellicles and the night they make what is known as "the Jellicle choice" and decide which cat will ascend to the Heaviside Layer and come back to a new life.







The cast and crew have worked tirelessly over the last 9 weeks and it has been a completely different show to work on with exciting challenges for both our students and choreographers.

Cats promises to be a phenomenal show and tickets will be on sale in January. It will run over four nights from Wednesday 27th February until Saturday 2nd March 2019 starting at 7.00pm with an extra Matinee performance on Saturday 2nd March at 2.00pm.

Science Update

Our Year 11 and 13 students have been extremely busy preparing for and sitting their mock examinations. So much time and effort has gone into lessons, intervention, revision and feedback for and by our students that they are in the best position for success.

Our extracurricular club, The Big Bang, is growing and, following national and regional winners in previous years, we will have representation at the national finals again in March with a project called Plastic Pilots. Chinazo Okeke and Shriya Chudasama are putting the final additions to their entry, which involves the creation of a tough but biodegradable plastic. They are true role models for female students interested in physics and engineering. They were the only female team at the regional heats and will be judged at the national Big Bang Fair finals at the NEC in March 2019. This is a huge STEM fair that attracts over 30,000 visitors and gives young people the chance to try out over 100 hands-on activities, see dozens of mind-boggling shows, hear from inspiring engineers and scientists from some of the UK's biggest companies and find out about the opportunities available in STEM.



We will be taking 100 students to the Big Bang Fair South East next June and will be represented by three competition entries hoping to win a place at the NEC in March 2020. All of our entries this year will be entered into junior categories (KS3). "Does exercise improve concentration?" is being investigated by Nyah Hawkes, Kincso Huczek and James Rice and will be entered in the science category. Alongside them will be our year 7 entry from Ohm Patel and Amanda De Andrade Colaco who are studying the relationship between stress levels and different types of video games. Our engineering entry is called, "Udderly Plastic". Year 9 girls, Lauren Nandlall and Beverley Usayi are experimenting with the ingredients for making a plastic that biodegrades from a milk base. Good luck to everyone taking part!



We have also continued to strengthen our links with local industry. On 22nd November twenty five year twelve students were hosted by THALES on Manor Royal for a tour of the site and apprenticeship information session. They found out about the level of qualification they could achieve whilst earning as they train. Year 13 students worked with THALES employees on immersion day where they were given a mock interview and instant feedback.

The science department had the pleasure of hosting all of Year 10 on the recent Immersion Day where students experienced a carousel of events which included:

- Animazing an interactive introduction into habitats and adaptations of exotic creatures
- Alchemy making gold coins
- The maggot maze a biological experiment about choice
- The great egg race a challenge to build a strong bridge from everyday materials
- The Cookie Hypothesis
- An introduction to psychology

Chaplaincy

Autumn term has not only seen the Chaplaincy welcome new students through retreat programmes and Masses, these additions have made for an exciting term with lots of new ideas, energy and new people actively involved in the spiritual life of the School.



Sacramental life of the School:

Weekly Mass: Our 9am Friday mass continues to run with the support of Fr Chris & Fr Louis of the Friary. All are warmly welcome to share in this weekly celebration with us including parents and parishioners. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all those who have volunteered to take on the various ministries at Mass including the readers (over forty different students have read at our Masses this term), the dedicated musicians (Anneka Dodd, Katelan Carter, Catherine Duggan-Jakes, Wilfreen Jadhav, Sebastian Lolo and Julia Gniadek), our regular altar server William Berry in Year10 and Chinazo Okeke in Year 12 who has been commissioned as a Eucharist Minister this term. We have also had some especially themed Masses this term.

Welcome Masses: We were able to continue with our recent tradition of making Mass the very first thing we do with Year 7 when they start at St Wilfrid's. We are indebted to our parents and primary school colleagues for preparing them so well, their full participation including singing and responses to the Mass was beautifully moving and of course special thanks to Fr Paul Fleetwood for celebrating this first Mass of the academic year with us. The 6th form welcome Mass had to be moved to the Hall again this year as we expected a big attendance. Upwards of 300 staff, students and parishioners attended this Mass that was celebrated by Fr Louis. Many thanks goes out to the 6th form committee and Chapel Choir for their passion and zeal in organising and promoting it. Again with thanks to Fr Louis we were able to have a voluntary Mass on All Saints day in school, followed by an All Souls Day Mass on the Friday. We also offered a special Mass in November for the intentions of all Deceased staff, students and Family members.

Autumn Term Activities:

Year 7 Retreats: Each tutor group in Year 7 had a whole day off timetable in late September or early October. The day was rooted in theme of the scriptural passage of 1 Corinthians 12-31, "one body with many parts". The aim of the day was to have fun, cement friendships and develop personal faith. The retreats were a great success and feedback from the students was very encouraging. For me it was a real highlight of my term to be able to spend more time with them in a relaxed environment and get to know our enthusiastic year 7s better. I must say that this year group's community days will always stand out to me as the year of the "Floss offs" and of course much singing of "Baby Shark"! The students really poured their energy and enthusiasm into the days and I look forward to seeing this year group as they progress through the school.




Year 10 Discipleship Day: This took place during our first Immersion day. The students had an opportunity to "shop" around, hearing different people share their take on discipleship. Our Disciples (The Dominican sisters, Fr Angelo and our local representative from CAFOD) talked about living in faith communities, putting faith into action through involvement in justice & peace groups, and expressing discipleship in an expressive way, through art and music. The day also covered the theme of discipleship from an academic point of view and explored deeper than would be possible in normal GCSE curriculum time the diverse ways that people live out their lives as Christian disciples. Huge thanks goes to all our visiting disciples, the RE team and last but not least the Year 10 students who approached the day with maturity and respect.

Autumn Term Activities Cont'd:

November, the Month of Remembrance: Throughout the month students have been able to contribute, prayers and names of people that they would like to remember at this time. All of these intentions were written down on "Poppy Petals" and were used to make up one big Poppy in the Chapel. The theme of Remembrance was particularly poignant as assembly was lead for the fifth year in a row by Our Head of History, Mr Pitman, who has serviced in the forces. Staff and students who are members of uniformed organisations were invited to wear their uniforms on Friday 9h November and a memorial service was held at break time. I'm sure many of you have noticed the wreaths they laid at the feet out our silhouetted soldiers. A short film capturing this mark of respect can be viewed on our school YouTube channel.

Year 7 Immersion Day: In November the RE department ran an immersion day for Year 7s. This day focuses on the message of the Papal encyclical, Laudato si. Students were able to take part in Fairtrade games, climate change workshops and refugee simulations in order to empathise with those involved in these issues. In keeping with the hallmark of this new year group, students really put their hearts and souls into the activities, and their concerns didn't stop there. The next weeks "One World Group" which had been promoted on the day had record numbers in attendance with 30+ new year 7 members

Year 13 Community Day: New to our community day programme this year was a day is to give the Year 13 community an opportunity to reflect and recharge after the challenges of the recent mock examinations. The programme for the day started with Mass in the Chapel and had time built in for relaxation and reflection, all with an Advent theme. The programme culminates in a day off timetable for all participants to reflect on their weekly sessions and celebrate the bonds that they have made with their peers. This took place aptly in the month of November this term. This year's liturgy will take place at 6.30pm on the 18th December, followed by our "Soup & Solidarity" event after the liturgy (solidarity with those doing the sleep out that night).

Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Success!
