



This Sunday's Gospel Reading
27th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year C
(Luke 17: 5-10)

At that time: The Apostles said to the Lord, 'Increase our faith!' And the Lord said, 'If you had faith like a grain of mustard seed, you could say to this mulberry tree, "Be uprooted and planted in the sea", and it would obey you. 'Will any one of you who has a servant ploughing or keeping sheep say to him when he has come in from the field, "Come at once and recline at table"? Will he not rather say to him, "Prepare supper for me, and dress properly, and serve me while I eat and drink, and afterwards you will eat and drink"? Does he thank the servant because he did what was commanded? So you also, when you have done all that you were commanded, say, "We are unworthy servants; we have only done what was our duty." '

Prayer One

***Reflection: In this week's Gospel
reading Jesus talks about Mustard
seeds and it's from these passages that
we get our theme of faith.***

The transformation of a seed into a tree or a bush is an amazing thing, but it's not something that just happens by accident. If you were paying attention in primary school, you'll remember that more often than not a seed won't grow unless it has things like good soil, nutrition, sunlight and so on...

Jesus compares our faith to a seed, and the main characteristic of seeds is that they grow. In other parts of the Gospels, Jesus talks about his Kingdom as being like a seed – something which may seem small, but which will grow into something wonderful, and fruitful.

If our faith is going to grow though, it is going to need the nourishment and care that young plants need. If it's left alone then it might well get into trouble.

Rather than water and sunlight and so on, our faith needs to be practiced and remembered. It needs to be evident in what we do and say. It needs to be watered and fed by prayer and it needs to be allowed to grow by being open to what God wants of us, and who God wants us to be. When we put our faith into action we live out Catholic Social Teachings

Reflection:

The idea of faith is a very misunderstood one. Take the word BELIEVE, for instance. It has to be one of the more common words in our language, but it's often a word that's thrown around very casually.



The idea of belief and faith is a massively important part of who we are. To say that we believe in something means that we are prepared to put our trust in it even if we can't see it. It means commitment. It means investing something of ourselves. It can even mean taking a risk in something when there is no obvious guarantee of getting anything back.

We take a few moments this morning to think about what we believe in. What are we prepared to take a risk on?

Reflection: This Saturday will see the Feast day of St. Francis of Assisi, one of the great Saints of the Church and the patron of one of the houses in our school.

St. Francis was a fascinating Saint, and one of the most popular in the history of the Church.

Francis came from a rich family. His Father was a wealthy merchant who used to take Francis on his business trips around Europe when he was a young boy.

Francis stood to inherit a great deal from his Father, but refused it all so that he could live a life of poverty and service, spreading the word of God and helping the poor.

Faith motivates us to do things that might seem a little crazy and unusual to other people. Few of us will be called to do what Francis did, but we are all called to put something of our own wishes and desires aside from time to time so that we can help those who are not as fortunate as ourselves.

In the letter of St. James in the New Testament, he tells the early Christians that *faith without works is dead.*

This is quite a challenging idea. If we claim that we believe in something, but we are completely unwilling to let it affect us, then it's pretty useless really.

So the question for us this week is this... How does our faith change who we are and what we do?
