





# ADVENT



## This Sunday's Gospel Reading 2nd Sunday in Advent Year C (Matthew 3: 1-12)

**'Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand.'**

In those days John the Baptist came preaching in the wilderness of Judea, 'Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand.' For this is he who was spoken of by the prophet Isaiah when he said, 'The voice of one crying in the wilderness: "Prepare the way of the Lord; make his paths straight." '

Now John wore a garment of camel's hair and a leather belt round his waist, and his food was locusts and wild honey. Then Jerusalem and all Judea and all the region about the Jordan were going out to him, and they were baptised by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins. But when he saw many of the Pharisees and Sadducees coming to his baptism, he said to them, 'You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the wrath to come? Bear fruit in keeping with repentance. And do not presume to say to yourselves, "We have Abraham as our father", for I tell you, God is able from these stones to raise up children for Abraham. Even now the axe is laid to the root of the trees. Every tree therefore that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire.

'I baptise you with water for repentance, but he who is coming after me is mightier than I, whose sandals I am not worthy to carry. He will baptise you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing fork is in his hand, and he will clear his threshing floor and gather his wheat into the barn, but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire.'

# Prayer Two

### ***Reflection:***

***On Sunday the Church celebrated Mary in the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception.***

***Many people mistakenly believe this feast celebrates Jesus' conception through the power of the Holy Spirit in the womb of Mary. However, the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception celebrates Mary's conception in the womb of Saint Anne without the stain of original sin. Jesus' conception is celebrated on the Feast of the Annunciation on March 25, nine months before Christmas.***



**The Church has long affirmed that after Jesus Christ (i.e. God!) Mary is the most important person that has ever lived. She is even designated 'Queen of Heaven' ranking above all the saints and angels.**



**Not bad for a teenage year old girl from a small town in the middle of nowhere. A girl who had no power, no money and no particular education.**

**So, what made Mary special? Well, there are a few things, but the main thing is that when she was challenged to do something she said yes without hesitation. The thing she was challenged to do was to allow God - in the form of Jesus - to be born into the world through her. When the Angel Gabriel visited her, Mary was about 14 or 15 years old. She wasn't married and so falling pregnant was a problem. It would bring her trouble, and she knew it, but nevertheless she said YES. She simply trusted in God and took whatever came. And because of that, the incarnation of Christ was possible.**

**There are a lot of lessons we can learn from Mary: Trusting in God, being selfless and generous, doing kind things for others... It's a real goldmine! Mary is also a key part of the Catholic Church's prayer traditions. Since Mary isn't God, we can't pray to her, but we can ask her to pray with us and for us. We do this through traditional prayers like the Hail Mary and the Rosary and others, which you may want to factor in to what you are planning for this week.**

**Soon after Mary became pregnant though, Joseph was visited by an angel, who told him not to worry. The angel told him that the child in Mary's womb was special and blessed, and that he should look after and care for them both.**

**Joseph is one of the characters of Advent that we tend to focus on the least, but he is one of the most important. Joseph is a great example to everybody who has ever stuck by somebody they loved, and been with them through thick and thin. He is an example of what it means to be a loving husband and a loving Father.**
