




This Sunday's Gospel Reading

(Matthew 17: 1-9)





Reflection

In this week's readings at Mass, we hear the story of the Transfiguration, when Jesus went up to the top of a mountain with a few of his disciples and something amazing happened



While they were at the top of the mountain Jesus' face and cloths started glowing and appeared in a brilliant white light. Moses and Elijah - two important figures from the past - then appeared next to Jesus and started talking to him.

Eventually, Moses and Elijah disappeared and only Jesus remained.

This event showed the disciples how important Jesus was and also how he had taken over the work of the important people of the past, like Moses and Elijah.

It is easy for us to forget how important Jesus is to us. Everything in our faith and our life centres on him and it is easy to forget or lose focus

Sometimes we need to be reminded, and Lent can be a great time to give ourselves that reminder and to have a new FOCUS




Final Prayer

We're now a couple of weeks into Lent, or thereabouts. It may have started well for you, or it may have been a bit of a rocky beginning.





cared for her and for Jesus.*



Final Prayer


Loving Father,
