



St Wilfrid's Win at The Big Bang Competition



Rushil Patel, Rory Nash and Aaron Erickson, also in Year 13, created a set of glasses that used artificial intelligence to

read facial expressions and then feed information to the wearer through an earpiece. Their project, called M.I.R.A. was developed to aid people with autism to have a better understanding of the world around them.

Both projects did really well in the regional heats in July 2019 and we were all devastated when the finals held at the NEC in Birmingham in March were cancelled due to the Coronavirus. Even with this stressful situation Chinazo, Shriya and Rushil (who took on M.I.R.A.'s entry on his own at this point) decided they would take up the Big Bangs offer of a digital final and did more work to produce video entries to sell their projects. This was all while staying focused and remaining totally up to date with their A-level studies. Then the final blow hit the next week as the students found out their A-level exams were no longer going to take place.

With all of these pressures these amazing St Wilfrid's students produced two outstanding digital entries which have been judged by professionals in the field against entries from all over the country.

Plastic Pilot came runner up in the Big Bang Senior Science category and M.I.R.A. won the Youth Industrial Strategy Competition Senior award. This was a special engineering award.

Rushil comments, "I am thrilled to have won the Senior category at the Youth Industrial Strategy competition. I really enjoyed working on our project and it was great to have the judges recognise the hard work and creativity that went into it.

This competition has provided me with a great opportunity to get creative with my learning and it was incredibly rewarding to work on a project that could help solve one of the most pressing social issues today."

Caitlin Brown, Project Manager for the Youth Industrial Strategy Competition, said: "The judges commended Rushil for his hard work, dedication and commitment to STEM. He thoroughly deserves to be crowned our Youth Industrial Strategy Competition Senior winner.

We are thrilled with the level of engagement and interest we have received around the Youth Industrial Strategy Competition, and are excited to see all these students, and more, continue to develop their love of STEM."

Mrs Tibble, Subject Leader for Science, commented "I couldn't have been more proud as I sent the entries off until today, when I found out that both projects had been awarded prizes in this prestigious competition. I would like to take this opportunity to say well done and thank you to all five of these students for their incredible contribution to Science at St Wilfrid's over the last 7 years."

St Wilfrid's raise the roof for Womens Rights!



In February our outstanding school production of Made In Dagenham, the musical based on the movie of the real-life 1968 sewing machinists strike at the Ford factory in Dagenham, Essex, played over four nights to sell out audiences.

Based on the 2010 film of the same name, Made in Dagenham is drawn from the real-life 1968 sewing machinists strike at the Ford factory in Dagenham, Essex. This strike was influential in the passing of the Equal Pay Act of 1970. The musical focuses on the leader of the strike, Rita O'Grady, as she encourages the women of the Ford factory to walk out after they are re-classified as unskilled workers, while their male counterparts see their wages increase.

St Wilfrid's production of Made in Dagenham was a bright, fast-paced, musical with lots of humour with a modern and vibrant musical score with fantastic choreography. It had the audience roaring with laughter and swaying in time to the music. Few in the enthusiastic audience could actually remember the period in which the action was set (1968), but there were plenty of indicators with which to help interpret the plot. In particular, the central theme of sexism and the role of women was given heavy prominence during the first half and must have felt utterly alien to the actors. The strength of the (old fashioned) trade unions and the Wilson Labour government's dependence upon them was yet to be challenged by Margaret Thatcher.



With a cast of 100 students, the cast was split into two so that as many of our talented students were able to perform in lead roles. Bobby Smith and Elisha Oak shared the role of Rita O'Grady, Callum Edwards and Niall O'Mara shared the role of Eddie O'Grady, Holly Scott and Maddie Hartney shared the role of Beryl, Grace O'Reilly and Amy O'Conner playing the role of Connie.

The women and girl machinists, foul-mouthed, feisty and with quantities of attitude to compensate for their lack of vocabulary, were a band to be reckoned with. In addition to Rita, Beryl and Connie were Katelan Carter and Hattie Burrows who played Sandra, Emie Sarmiento and Tia Porter who played Clare, Molly Collier and Grace Graham who played Brenda and Beverley Usayi and Scarlett Confiac who played Cass. All were magnificent in their energy and sassiness.



Similarly, the factory men posed, swaggered and were appropriately physical in their blue overalls. Kyle Sukazi, Kiran Trivedi, Dylan Waring, Dominic Smith, Henry Olding, Thomas Draddy, William Berry, and other actors multi-tasking were all suitably macho. Ensemble players and dancers too numerous to mention individually, many with multiple roles, all put their hearts into the show; they were movement and musically perfect in what was a real company performance.



The choreography for Made in Dagenham this year presented slightly different challenges than our previous year of Cats. This year Mrs Lintern-Goodall, Miss Kennedy and Associate choreographer Orla Gledhill worked hard to ensure that every piece of movement communicated the struggle and fight of the women workers at Ford. This gestural choreography also included 99 cast members, making the choreographers task a tough one for the big numbers with all cast on stage.

The highlights of the performances were the characterisation of the mechanics performed by the all boy dance team in Made in Dagenham, the amazing kick line in This is America from our team of cheerleaders and the slick and complex choreography of the sewing machine props and material throughout from our main cast members. The ensemble did well supporting dancers on stage throughout all songs with their gestural movement and overall it made our story come to life. Another production has gone by where Miss Kennedy and Mrs Lintern-Goodall were incredibly proud of their Dance team and all of the amazing performances!

Mr Michael Ferry, Headteacher, commented, "The school productions are a high point of the school year. Once again, after all the hard work and eager anticipation, the students have excelled themselves! I must say a huge thank you to the dedicated team of staff, led notably by Mr James Hadden, who is leaving us this term, continue to ensure that school productions at St Wilfrid's go from strength to strength. As their Headteacher, it makes me so proud to know that they have worked so hard to maximise their talents and in doing so reinforce the growing reputation of St Wilfrid's. This is their school, their production and, in my eyes, they are outstanding and I am incredibly proud of them all."

James Hadden, Subject Leader for Drama and the Director for Made In Dagenham commented, "This was another ambitious show for us to take on and our students did not disappoint with their amazing ability, both on and off stage. As ever it is brilliant to see them step up to the challenge and I am immensely proud of them all, along with the amazing support from all the staff involved. So that's it! It is very sad to say goodbye to St Wilfrid's and the school productions. It has been a huge part of my life, something I will always cherish and I have been very lucky to have been surrounded by the most amazing, talented and passionate students and staff and the most supportive parents. St Wilfrid's will always be my home."

This year has been a very positive and consistent year for our house which has seen much activity enabling a great sense of community to be evident. The latest newcomers to our house (7WA) have brought a great sense of enthusiasm and energy for their house activities and endeavours, showing their prowess namely in the Inter-House football tournament at the beginning of the year with both the Boys and Girls coming out victorious in their respective tournaments. Fundraising has been a particular highlight for Augustine House this year with some very successful fundraising events particularly from 7WA who raised £98 from a tuck shop and 10HA who raised £149 from their

annual film night. Augustine House raised a tremendous £2068 so far. The Augustine House Reps have considered various ways in which we can raise awareness for Crawley Open House who provides incredible support, services and compassion for those suffering the effects of homelessness, unemployment, loneliness, discrimination, or other forms of social exclusion. As such, many staff and students as part of Augustine House have agreed to commit to personal daily/monthly challenges for the duration of this time until the school officially reopens. These include some exercise and workout challenges each day such as 50 press-ups/sit-ups/squats; maintaining 8k steps per day despite the current stay-at-home limits, learning a different yoga position each day, as well as other challenges such as cooking and learning new languages; some students have also taken to avoid using their phones every other day. 
Francis House:

Over the past year the Camps International team have been tirelessly fundraising to meet their

£28,000 target by running the Valentines disco, baking, entertaining and selling snacks, just to name a few of their events!

"I want to go to Kenya because I love helping people and I love making a difference for other people's lives. The look of joy that will be on their faces will make up for all the hours of fundraising that we have had to do. I want to go into a job that helps people and will make a difference so this will really help me understand properly what helping people actually means," says Nyah Hawkes, 10JB.

So what's it all for? Monday 20th July will see us begin the

adventure of a lifetime, boarding our flight to Kenya. We will spend a month of our summer holidays working tirelessly on a range of projects intended to improve the lives of local communities and of Kenya's wonderful wildlife. The population of Kenya is diverse but one consistency is that of poverty. Almost half of all Kenyans live on just \$1 per day and most can expect to live to only 55 years old. We want to make a difference.

We are dedicated to changing lives and will be involved in a number of projects in Tsavo National Park; home to the most breath taking of species including elephants, zebras, giraffes, big cats and monkeys alongside many different bird and plant species. These animals are free to roam the expanse of the national park. We will be assisting the local rangers by digging water holes, installing protective fencing, deterring poachers and even de-worming the odd goat or two for the tribes.

We are looking forward to staying in one of Kenya's poorest villages; Muhaka where we will repair homes and school buildings, learn the language and make friends with local children.

My own personal reflection on this time:





Rugby
