

Pupil Premium Report

Pupil Premium is additional to main school funding in order to address the current underlying inequalities between children eligible for free school meals (FSM), looked after children and those whose parents serve in the armed forces and their peers, by ensuring that there is funding to tackle disadvantage students who need it most and focusing on the attainment of these students.

The government has allocated this money to schools, as they believe that head teachers and school leaders should decide how to use the pupil premium within their school to narrow the gap in attainment between these students and their peers.

The following information provides a summary of the above. All allocations are targeted at FSM Students, including those who have had the entitlement previously in the past 6 years, looked after children and service children.

The money allocated to St Wilfrid's school for 2014/2015 is £148,950. Below are some examples of the range of provisions provided:

- Funding of additional Specialist Teachers for one to one teaching
- Increased TA support in KS3 to support learning
- Additional qualified teacher support in the classroom
- Good education is vital to improving life chances for all students the Pupil Premium enables the school to meet the needs of the individual students
- Inclusion in enrichment activities including curriculum enriched school trips
- Support as necessary towards uniform costs
- To provided extracurricular sessions during school holidays
- Student support from external motivational organisations
- Provision of tablets to support individual students where the need is clearly identified
- Increased access to specialist support services
- Purchase of software to assist with the tracking of pupil premium students
