



This Sunday's Gospel Reading 24th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year C
(Luke 15: 1-10)

Now the tax collectors and sinners were all drawing near to hear him. And the Pharisees and the scribes murmured, saying, "This man receives sinners and eats with them."

So he told them this parable: "What man of you, having a hundred sheep, if he has lost one of them, does not leave the ninety-nine in the wilderness, and go after the one which is lost, until he finds it? And when he has found it, he lays it on his shoulders, rejoicing. And when he comes home, he calls together his friends and his neighbours, saying to them, `Rejoice with me, for I have found my sheep which was lost.' Just so, I tell you, there will be more joy in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous persons who need no repentance. "Or what woman, having ten silver coins, if she loses one coin, does not light a lamp and sweep the house and seek diligently until she finds it? And when she has found it, she calls together her friends and neighbours, saying, `Rejoice with me, for I have found the coin which I had lost.' Just so, I tell you, there is joy before the angels of God over one sinner who repents."

And he said, "There was a man who had two sons; and the younger of them said to his father, `Father, give me the share of property that falls to me.' And he divided his living between them. Not many days later, the younger son gathered all he had and took his journey into a far country, and there he squandered his property in loose living. And when he had spent everything, a great famine arose in that country, and he began to be in want. So he went and joined himself to one of the citizens of that country, who sent him into his fields to feed swine. And he would gladly have fed on the pods that the swine ate; and no one gave him anything. But when he came to himself he said, `How many of my father's hired servants have bread enough and to spare, but I perish here with hunger! I will arise and go to my father, and I will say to him, "Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son; treat me as one of your hired servants."' And he arose and came to his father. But while he was yet at a distance, his father saw him and had compassion, and ran and embraced him and kissed him. And the son said to him, `Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son.' But the father said to his servants, `Bring quickly the best robe, and put it on him; and put a ring on his hand, and shoes on his feet; and bring the fatted calf and kill it, and let us eat and make merry; for this my son was dead, and is alive again; he was lost, and is found.' And they began to make merry.

"Now his elder son was in the field; and as he came and drew near to the house, he heard music and dancing. And he called one of the servants and asked what this meant. And he said to him, `Your brother has come, and your father has killed the fatted calf, because he has received him safe and sound.' But he was angry and refused to go in. His father came out and entreated him, but he answered his father, `Lo, these many years I have served you, and I never disobeyed your command; yet you never gave me a kid, that I might make merry with my friends. But when this son of yours came, who has devoured your living with harlots, you killed for him the fatted calf!' And he said to him, `Son, you are always with me, and all that is mine is yours. It was fitting to make merry and be glad, for this your brother was dead, and is alive; he was lost, and is found.'"




Prayer One

***Reflection: This week's Gospel gives us
a story of forgiveness and gratitude***



This week's Gospel gives us the story of the Prodigal Son. It's a parable Jesus told about a son who took his share of his inheritance from his Father and went away and wasted it all. Once he realised how much things had gone wrong, he went crawling back to his Father, expecting to be treated harshly. Instead, his Father forgave him and welcomed him back with love and joy. You might look at that story and argue that the son didn't deserve the welcome and the forgiveness he got, and he really didn't. In fact, that's the whole point of the story. People may not deserve forgiveness, but we give it anyway. Giving it anyway is what makes us good, loving people. This week, why not take some time to think about your lives and think about what you have that you really DON'T deserve..? This isn't an exercise designed to make you feel guilty, but rather to make you feel grateful and happy. We have been given so many things that we could never possibly have earned. Hopefully, this makes us grateful. Hopefully it also makes us want to treat others with the same love and generosity we have been shown.

Reflection:

The story of the Prodigal Son which we get in this week's Gospel is a great story about forgiveness and gratitude, but it's also the story of a family


Prayer Three

Reflection:

*This week we celebrate the feast of The
Exaltation of the Holy Cross (14th Sept)*



When we celebrate the Exaltation of the Holy Cross, in fact anytime that we think about the cross, we remember the greatest act of love and sacrifice that the world has ever known.

The Carthusian Monks have as their motto *Stat crux dum volvitur orbis*. In English: *The cross stays still while the world is turning*. The point being that in a hectic, confusing world, it's the one thing that stays true and reliable. The great act of love is a great hope and sources of strength for us all.

This hope and strength stem from the fact that our God chose to act. He chose to become a man. Ultimately, he chose the cross. Through his death on the cross, Jesus gave us a way to know the love of God, the forgiveness of our sins and eternal life with him.

The cross reminds us that we are loved by God, but it also reminds us that acting has powerful consequences, and that by getting involved and helping out we can make a real difference. Certainly, none of us are Jesus. But we are called to be giving and loving, just as he was.
