

This Sunday's Gospel Reading
4th Sunday of Easter, Year A
(John 10: 1-10)

"Truly, truly, I say to you, he who does not enter the sheepfold by the door but climbs in by another way, that man is a thief and a robber; but he who enters by the door is the shepherd of the sheep. To him the gatekeeper opens; the sheep hear his voice, and he calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. When he has brought out all his own, he goes before them, and the sheep follow him, for they know his voice. A stranger they will not follow, but they will flee from him, for they do not know the voice of strangers." This figure Jesus used with them, but they did not understand what he was saying to them.

So Jesus again said to them, "Truly, truly, I say to you, I am the door of the sheep. All who came before me are thieves and robbers; but the sheep did not heed them. I am the door; if any one enters by me, he will be saved, and will go in and out and find pasture. The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy; I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly.

Reflection:

*Our theme this week is Fullness of Life.
We chose this because in the Gospel
reading, Jesus talks about the fact that he

The Church always talks about the need to protect *life from conception to natural death.*

This is a phrase we hear a lot and it reminds us that life is important. Right from when a baby is being formed in the womb, through it's birth, through childhood, through adulthood and throughout life. At every step we believe that a person is special and that life can have unlimited possibilities. Each person has the right to be loved and to love others, the right to be respected and the right to learn about who they are and why God made them.

Let us take a moment today to pray for life. There are lots of threats to life, and so it's important to pray that human life is respected. We should also take a minute to pray for those trying to defend life and human rights.

Loving Father,

We thank you for the gift of life, and we pray for all those whose life is in danger. We pray for those whose rights are oppressed in brutal countries, for those who are the victim of crime and natural disaster, and for all those whose lives are under threat. Work in the hearts of those who threaten others, and give courage and wisdom to those who work for justice.

Prayer Two



Reflection:

In this week's Gospel, Jesus said

'I have come that they might have life, and have it to the full!'



This is a brilliant phrase, and it is one of the most commonly used phrases in the bible. But what does it mean to have life to the full? And how does Jesus offer it to us?

Everything that we have comes from God, and we are called to recognise this.

We are also asked to listen to God's word and to do the things that he asks us to do.

One of the main things that God asks us to do is to Love one another. This crops up again and again, especially in John's Gospel and it's an important thing to focus on during Easter.

By loving others and by being loved ourselves, we become happier, more fulfilled and we make more of a difference. In short, we start to find the 'life to the full' that Jesus promised.

During this week in 1973 two American men called Levi Strauss and Jacob Davis received a patent for an idea they had. Their idea was to use denim and copper rivets to make trousers for farmers, cattle ranchers and other working men.

The idea caught on, and their invention - denim jeans - became one of the most enduring and long-lasting items of clothing the world had ever seen. Pretty impressive, given how quickly fashions come and go. It's even more impressive, when you consider that jeans were never meant to be high fashion, or expensive, luxury items, but just working clothes.

What Levi Strauss and Jacob Davis demonstrated is the capacity that people have to come up with good ideas and make a difference. They also showed the world that with a bit of hard work, a simple idea can go a very long way.
