

This Sunday's Gospel 23rd Sunday in Ordinary Time Year A (Matthew 18: 15-20)

Jesus said to his disciples: 'If your brother does something wrong, go and have it out with him alone, between your two selves. If he listens to you, you have won back your brother. If he does not listen, take one or two others along with you: the evidence of two or three witnesses is required to sustain any charge. But if he refuses to listen to these, report it to the community; and if he refuses to listen to the community, treat him like a pagan or a tax collector.

'I tell you solemnly, whatever you bind on earth shall be considered bound in heaven; whatever you loose on earth shall be considered loosed in heaven.

'I tell you solemnly once again, if two of you on earth agree to ask anything at all, it will be granted to you by my Father in heaven. For where two or three meet in my name, I shall be there with them.'

Reflection:

September 11th is a date that many of us link with suffering. During this week in 2001, thousands of people died in New York and Washington at the hands of 19 hijackers.

The attacks of September 11th caused so much suffering and fear. A lot of people lost loved ones. A lot of people lost property and employment, and a lot of people lost the sense of safety that they had taken for granted.

It's often quite common to react to something like this with anger. It's natural to want revenge or at least some kind of justice, and since 2001 a great deal has been done to respond to the attacks of September 11th.

For those of us who can't really influence world affairs, it's easy to feel powerless and weak when things like this happen, but there are things that we can all do.

Perhaps the most powerful thing we can do is simply to pray.

Lets take a few moments as we start this day to pray for peace in the world, and for those who have been affected by evil acts.
