

From this Sunday's Readings Solemnity of Christ the King Year B

Matthew 25: 31-46

Jesus said to his disciples: 'When the Son of Man comes in his glory, escorted by all the angels, then he will take his seat on his throne of glory. All the nations will be assembled before him and he will separate men one from another as the shepherd separates sheep from goats. He will place the sheep on his right hand and the goats on his left. 'Then the King will say to those on his right hand, "Come, you whom my Father has blessed," take for your heritage the kingdom prepared for you since the foundation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me food; I was thirsty and you gave me drink; I was a stranger and you made me welcome; naked and you clothed me, sick and you visited me, in prison and you came to see me." Then the virtuous will say to him in reply, "Lord," when did we see you hungry and feed you; or thirsty and give you drink? When did we see you a stranger and make you welcome; naked and clothe you; sick or in prison and go to see you?" And the King will answer, "I tell you solemnly, in so far as you did this to one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did it to me." 'Next he will say to those on his left hand, "Go away from me, with your curse upon you, to the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels. For I was hungry and you never gave me food; I was thirsty and you never gave me anything to drink; I was a stranger and you never made me welcome, naked and you never clothed me, sick and in prison and you never visited me." Then it will be their turn to ask, "Lord, when did we see you hungry or thirsty, a stranger or naked, sick or in prison, and did not come to your help?" Then he will answer, "I tell you solemnly, in so far as you neglected to do this to one of the least of these, you neglected to do it to me."


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National Youth Sunday hopefully reminds young people that they are an important and valuable part of the Church. The Church loves them and the Church needs them.

Reflection:
Around this time in 2001 and young
American man was caught fighting
alongside the Taliban in Afghanistan.
He was fighting against his fellow
countrymen.

John Walker had been raised a Catholic but had walked away from is faith early in life. When he was in his late teens he went travelling and soon became inspired by people he met who were linked to terrorist organisations.

When the US invaded Afghanistan in 2001 they caught Walker along with dozens of other Taliban fighters after a long siege in a fort. They were shocked and surprised to learn that he was one of their own countrymen. The media picked up on the story and he soon became known as the American Taliban.

This week we think about the theme of Youth, and it's worth remembering that sometimes young people can wander into dangerous and worrying things.

Perhaps today we can pray for all the young people who have gone off the rails, and especially for all those who are in danger.

Reflection
This week's Gospel reading reminds us that, if
we take our faith seriously, then Christ is at
the heart of everything that we do.

As well as being National Youth Sunday this Sunday was also the Feast of Christ the King. This marks the formal end of the Church's year before we begin a New Year at the start of Advent this Sunday. It also reminds us, as the Gospel does, that faith is real and serious, and makes a difference to our lives.

The Feast of Christ the King was instituted by Pope Pius XI in order to combat secularism. Secularism is a movement which tries to claim that religion was unnecessary and even problematic. Unsurprisingly, the Pope had a different view! He wanted to remind the world that the Gospel had the answers to many of the problems that they struggled with, and that the example and the love of Christ still had the power to transform our world, and always would.

We are reminded that we are made by God, loved by God and guided by God. His teachings are a light to guide us and we can turn to him in pray whenever we have doubts, questions or problems.

Final Prayer:


Loving Father,
